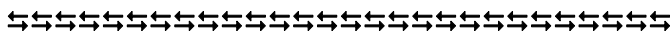

ATTENDANCE Tonight's attendance of **72,808** brought the final count to **1,494,130** for the 2023-24 bowl season, an average of **35,575** for 42 FBS bowl games.

ONE-LINER QUICKIES

- The **No. 1** seed won for the fourth in 10 CFP games. The winning team has now been seeded 4, 2, 2, 4, 2, 1, 1, 3, 1 and 1. The team that scored first is now 5-5.
- **Wire-to-Wire.** Michigan joins Alabama in 2021 (against Ohio State) and Georgia in 2023 (against TCU) to lead from start-to-finish in the CFP championship game. The Wolverines led for

55:14, the second-most by any team in a CFP title game (Behind UGA's 56:01 last year).

- **No. 1 vs. No. 2.** Michigan's win was the fourth straight by a No. 1 over a No. 2, and the No. 1 team now leads **34-25-3** all-time dating back to the start of the poll era (1936).
- **Michigan** finishes **15-0**, joining Clemson (2018), LSU (2019) and Georgia (2022) as the only 15-win teams since the late 1800s. Washington finishes with a **14-1** mark (still one of 19 occasions a team has won 14 or more, by 11 different schools).
- The winner of the coin toss is now **6-4**, only Oregon won and chose to go on offense first; all others went on defense.
- **Halftime Edge.** Michigan, with a 17-10 halftime lead, finished the season leading at halftime in all 15 games; it last trailed in the CPF semifinal last year against TCU (21-6).
- Washington committed its fifth turnover to open a second half this season (four interceptions, one fumble).
- Washington came into the game tied for third in the nation with **89** plays of 20-plus yards and tied for fourth with 44 30-plus yards; it had just **one** over 20 tonight (Penix to Odunze for 44 yards in the fourth quarter, on its 59th play of the game).
- By contrast, Michigan came in tied for 112th in the nation with just **19** plays of 30 yards or longer; it had **six** this evening.
- Michigan is the fourth CFP champion to win the title without committing a turnover, joining Alabama (2016), LSU (2020) and Georgia (2013). In **35** championship games in the postseason, the team that wins the turnover battle is now **27-5** (three times each had the same).

• In those same 35 title games, the team with the most rushing yards is now **24-11**; Michigan outrushed Washington, **303-46**. The team leading after three quarters is now **27-7** (tied after three one time).

• There were "just" nine combined scores in the game (Michigan 6, Washington 3), the first time there were less than 10 in a CFP title game. The 47 combined points is also the lowest scoring title game, edging out the 2018 game (Alabama 26, Georgia 23). It is the lowest scoring Nos. 1 vs. 2 game since Alabama beat LSU, 21-0, in the 2012 BCS title game.

- This was the first win by a **No. 1** team from the Big Ten over a No. 2 team since Nov. 18, 2006, when Ohio State won a wild one over Michigan, 42-39.
- **Michigan Defense:** The Wolverines finished the year with the opponent having **165** possessions (not including kneel-downs), holding them to no first downs **75** times (45.5 percent of the time).
- **Washington Offense.** The Huskies had scored on **84** of **151** possessions entering tonight, but could muster just three on 12 (not including the kneel-down at the end of the first half).
- **Michigan Offense.** The Wolverines maintained their first quarter dominance, outscoring UW **14-3**, thus ending the season with a 137-36 edge in the period. The 11-point lead was the largest after the first quarter in all 10 CFP games, topping the 17-7 lead Georgia had over TCU last year.
- **Punch vs. Counter Punch Winner: Michigan.** Washington came in averaging **7.25** yards per play (fifth in the NCAA); Michigan came in allowing **4.29** yards per play (fourth). Washington ran 71 plays for 301 yards, or **4.24** per.
- For the first time in a CFP title game, a team (Michigan) had two players rush for over 100 yards: **Blake Corum** (21-134) and **Donovan Edwards** (6-104). They are the fourth and fifth rushers to post 100-yard games in a CFP title game. Clyde Edwards-Helaire of LSU was the last to do it (16-110) in 2020 versus Clemson. Corum and Edwards now list fourth and fifth for most rushing yards in a CFP National Championship Game.
--Corum's **59-yard** run in the first half was the second-longest rush in a CFP title game.
- **Margin of Victory.** The 21-point winning margin marks the fifth time of the last six CFP National Championship games for the final score to have a 17-point margin or greater, and the sixth consecutive to have a double-digit final margin:
2024 (21 points): Michigan 34, Washington 13
2023 (58 points): Georgia 65, TCU 7
2022 (15 points): Georgia 33, Alabama 18
2021 (28 points): Alabama 52, Ohio State 24
2020 (17 points): LSU 42, Clemson 25
2019 (28 points): Clemson 44, Alabama 16
- Michigan's **443** total yards marks the ninth time the Wolverines have topped 400 yards this season and the first time in six games (last was 445 at Purdue on Nov. 4).
- Washington's **46** rushing yards are its second-lowest total of the season (low of 13 vs. Arizona State on Oct. 21).
- Michigan's **1-of-10** on third down was the second-worst in a CFP title game, behind Clemson's **1-of-11** versus LSU in 2021. The combined **3-of-24** by both teams was the worst, "besting" the 5-of-25 in that Clemson-LSU game.
- Michigan now has **86** wins over ranked teams since 1989, when the AP expanded to a top 25; that trails Alabama (114), Ohio State (107), LSU (91) and Florida State (87); the win tonight broke a tie with Oklahoma.
- Came close, but there still has not been a CFP title game where both teams scored in all four quarters (this was the sixth with seven).

- **Almost Caught The Ducks.** With tonight's 21-point win, Michigan finished the season with a **plus-382** point differential, second only to Oregon, which was at plus-388.
- **Final 2023-24 Bowls Points Breakdown** (42 games): 2181 points: 273 TDs (129 rush, 129 pass, 12 defensive, 3 kick return); 91 FG; 248 PAT; 9 2-Pt PAT; 2 SAF. Both teams scored in 81 of 168 quarters (just 9 scoreless quarters); at least one score was registered 237 out of a possible 336 times.
- In the 42 bowl games, **19** teams never trailed including Michigan tonight. There were **31** ties and **41** lead changes, with five teams rallying to win after being down two scores (UTSA, 0-14; Western Kentucky, 0-28; UCLA, 7-16; Georgia Tech, 3-17 and Clemson, 10-21).
- **Michigan** is now **23-29** in bowl/postseason games, while Washington fell to **20-21-1**; in CFP games, Michigan is now 2-3, Washington 1-2.
- In the 30 overall CFP games, the No. 1 seeds improved to **12-6**, with the No. 2's now **9-7** (the No. 3's are 5-9 and the No. 4's 5-8).
- Over the last two seasons, the Big Ten is now **19-22** against Power 5 teams, while the Pac-12 is **17-18**.
- The 10 CFP Championship games have now drawn **693,768** in attendance; that's an average of 69,377. Minus the COVID-19 year, the nine other games have had 678,842 in attendance, an average of 75,427.

Postgame Notes: Michigan vs. Washington January 8, 2024

- The Wolverines are 2023 CFP National Champions. It is the 12th national title in program history and the first since the end of the 1997 season.
- After a 0-2 mark in the College Football Playoffs in 2021 and 2022, the Wolverines are now 2-2 in the postseason event. The CFP expands to include 12 teams, as opposed to four, at the end of the 2024 regular season.
- U-M ends the season with a perfect 15-0 record. Clemson (2018), LSU (2019), and Georgia (2022) are the only other teams in college football history to achieve a single-season record of 15 wins without a loss. It is the winningest season in Michigan history. U-M's 28 wins over the past two seasons (2022-23) and 40 wins over the past three seasons (2021-22-23) are program records over two- and three-year stretches.
- Michigan is the second Big Ten team to win a national championship in the CFP era (Ohio State, 2014).
- Donovan Edwards' first-quarter rushing touchdown (41 yards) broke open the scoring. It was Edwards' longest run of the season and the second-longest touchdown run in the history of the College Football Playoff National Title game (Derrick Henry, 50 yards vs. Clemson, Jan. 11, 2016), until it was pushed down to third all-time by Edwards' next run.
- On the very next offensive possession, Edwards burst through for a 46-yard score. That marked the new second-longest touchdown run in CFP title game history, and Edwards' new longest run of the season. His previous long rush during the 2023 season was 22 yards.
- Edwards is the first player in CFP National Title Game history to run for two touchdowns of 40-plus yards.
- Michigan's offense was explosive in the first half, with four plays of 35-plus yards. Three run plays of 40-plus yards, including a 59-yard run from Blake Corum (his season long), helped produce 174 total rush yards in the first quarter, a season-best for the Wolverines. U-M's 209 first-half rush yards were also a single-half season-best.
- Michigan is the first team in CFP history to record three 40-plus yard rushes in one half of a CFP game. Georgia (2018 Rose Bowl Semifinal vs. Oklahoma) is the only other team with three 40-plus yard rushes in a CFP game.
- In the fourth quarter, Corum capped off a five play, 71 yard drive with a 12-yard touchdown run. It was Corum's 26th touchdown on the season, 57th on his career, and capped off a wire-to-wire season-long streak of Corum recording a rushing touchdown in a game.
- Both Corum and Edwards eclipsed 100 yards rushing. It was the first time this season that multiple U-M ball carriers cracked the 100-yard mark (last: 2022 at Rutgers). It was the first time in CFP Title Game history that a team produced two 100-yard rushers in the game.

- It is the third time in the last two seasons that both Corum and Edwards went over 100 yards rushing in the same game (2022 vs. Penn State, at Rutgers).
- Both Corum and Edwards also recorded two rushing touchdowns in the game. It was the first time since September 18, 2021 that multiple U-M ball carriers recorded multiple rushing touchdowns, and the second time in CFP Title Game history that a team produced the feat (2022 Georgia).
- The offense finished with 304 total rushing yards, both a season-high for the Wolverines and a CFP title game high. It was U-M's fourth time with over 200-plus team rushing yards rushing this season.
- The 10 points Washington scored in the first half marked its second-lowest scoring half of the season (three points, first half vs. Arizona State).
- On the first scrimmage play of the second half, Will Johnson intercepted Washington quarterback Michael Penix. It was Johnson's fourth pick of the year.
- In the fourth quarter, Mike Sainristil recorded his team-leading sixth interception of the season, returning it for a season-long 81 yards. It was the longest interception return in CFP Title game history, and the second longest in CFP history (86 yards, Clemson, 2016 Fiesta Bowl)
- The Huskies' season-high in punts was six (against Washington State). In the CFP title game, the Wolverines forced five.

Washington vs. Michigan
NRG Stadium, Houston, Jan. 8, 2024**

UW's Michael Penix Jr. finished the season with a school-record 4,903 yards, second-most in Pac-12 history and 22nd in NCAA-FBS single-season history. His 9,544 career passing yards, in just two seasons in Seattle, rank third in UW history, and 25th in Pac-12 history.

Rome Odunze finished the season with a school-record 1,640 yards, third-most in Pac-12 history.

Washington reached 14 wins for the first time in program history, having already broken the school record with its 13th win, vs. Oregon in the Pac-12 Championship Game. Twice before, UW has won 12 games – 12-0 in 1991 and 12-2 in 2016.

Washington saw its streak of 21 straight wins come to an end. It was the third-longest win streak in program history (longer UW streaks: 40 straight wins 1908-16; 22 straight wins 1990-92).

The Huskies had not trailed by more than seven points all season until the first quarter of tonight's game, when Michigan took a 14-3 lead on Donovan Edwards' second long rushing score with 2:23 left in the first quarter. UW didn't cut the lead to seven points until the Huskies' score with 0:42 left in the second, meaning the deficit was seven for more for 16 minutes, 41 seconds.

Coming into the game, UW's defense had allowed just two rushes for 40 or more yards all season before Edwards' two scoring runs (41 and 46 yards) and another, non-scoring carry of 59 yards from UM's Blake Corum in the first quarter.

Washington head coach Kalen DeBoer is now 104-12 as a head coach, and is 25-3 at UW, including 14-0 at home. He is also 18-3 as a head coach in playoff games and 10-1 vs. ranked teams.

JIM HARBAUGH: I'm really glad you chose Michigan, too.

BLAKE CORUM: This is another reason why I came, by the way.

J.J. MCCARTHY: I would just say Coach Harbaugh hit on it last night. It takes a lot more than just being a football player to be a Michigan man. Everything that -- the rigorous school schedule, the rigorous football schedule, it just forges us into these Michigan men. Couldn't be in a better spot. Like Blake said, greatest university in the world.

Q. J.J., can you talk about the ebb and flow of this game? Early on felt like you guys ran out to a lead and then it slowed down. And particularly when it all kind of came together on that third-down play where you ended up having to scramble -- I don't know if that was a called play or not -- and how that turned, what you were thinking on that play, et cetera?

J.J. MCCARTHY: We started off really hot. Everything was clicking. But I feel like we got to points in the game where we were beating ourselves. I was missing throws. I was missing some reads. And it just comes down to moving on to the next play, flushing the last play, and just staying in the present moment and just trying to attack one play at a time.

The third-down run, I just saw it on film all week that they were going to give me an opportunity at some point. Being backed up like that, you don't want to be sitting back in the end zone for too long. And I just saw the crease, the offensive line did a great job of making sure they didn't shed those blocks, and the rest is history.

Q. Blake, we'll start with you, it seemed like in all the big moments this season, the leaders, the captains, the star players always stepped up. Can you just talk about what that felt like or when you knew that the team needed you to make a big play, especially in today's game?

BLAKE CORUM: Playmakers, you know, coaches always say, playmakers have to make plays. And don't wait on anyone else to make a play. But today was a complete, complete team effort. There's so many people making plays out there.

And when we needed a play, someone made it, whether it had been myself or whether it had been Will or J.J. or Donovan, Colston. I could keep going on just because so many guys made plays. But when the play needs to be made, playmakers make them. And we have a lot of them.

WILL JOHNSON: Like Blake said, in these type of games, big time players make big time plays. I just give all the credit to our coaches and all the people that helped us prepare for these games. That's just what it is. We prepare for it, so we were ready for the moment.

J.J. MCCARTHY: It doesn't happen unless all 11 are clicking. The players, they really can't make the plays unless everyone's on the same page. So all credit goes to everybody out there on the field and the coaches.

Q. J.J. and Blake, obviously last year you were standing on the sidelines in the Fiesta Bowl as the confetti came down. How far have you come from that moment, and how much have you learned from your last two runs in the playoffs to kind of help get to you this point?

J.J. MCCARTHY: I'd say we came a long way, but in order to accomplish things like this, you've got to go to those dark places where everything's not great.

And just the response, the urgency right after that last game last year, it was different. I knew it. Just from being on the podium last year and saying we would be back. I knew the guys that were coming back. I had this feeling that it was going to be where we are right now.

And just all credit goes to the players on this team, everybody in that facility, Coach Harbaugh. That man, he's the reason we're here today. So just all thanks to him and to everybody on the team.

BLAKE CORUM: For me, when we all decided to come back, we knew what it took to get here, right? And when we all said we were coming back, and the guys that had no other choice but to come back, we had to pay attention to details. And our strength coach actually hit on it last night when he was talking to us.

But it's the little things, the details and the details we really locked in on those details all the way back to winter

workouts, summer workouts, we were trying to execute at a high level and pay attention to detail. I think that's what separated us a lot.

Q. You could go 15-0, run the table, easily win every game, you'd be elated right now no matter what happened. I'm trying to ask you, this was not a season where everything went the way you wanted it to. There was the off-the-field issues which we all know about. Could you talk about the satisfaction having overcome those as well to get to this point? Does it make it even sweeter?

JIM HARBAUGH: It couldn't have gone better. It went exactly how we wanted it to go to win every game. The off-the-field issues, we're innocent and we stood strong and tall because we knew we were innocent. And I'd like to point that out.

And these guys are innocent. And overcome that, it wasn't that hard because we knew we were innocent.

So yeah, that's really what I wanted to say. It went exactly how we wanted it to go. It went exactly how we wanted it to go.

WILL JOHNSON: I would just say that the coaches, Coach Harbaugh and Coach Herb and all those guys instill in us, the distractions, we're built to last no matter what the outside circumstance is. That's just what we're all about.

JIM HARBAUGH: I also want to point out, nothing fancy here. There was nothing surprising. It was just good old-fashioned teamwork, good old-fashioned hard work by these players and these coaches and none of us are up here taking a deep, long bow because we know this was just good old-fashioned teamwork.

BLAKE CORUM: Bunch of blue-collar guys.

Q. Blake, you guys rushed for 303 yards on 8 yards per carry tonight. You started hot in the running game, they adjusted, you finish. How satisfying or how happy were you for Donovan, first of all, and how satisfying was it to close out with the running game?

BLAKE CORUM: I was so excited for Donovan because I just felt like he needed that. He needed it. He's back. Dono is back. And I don't know what he's going to do after this. I hope he just celebrates and doesn't think about what decision he's going to make.

But I was happy for him. That's something Donovan, he was praying for. He talked to the media the other day I; listened to the interview. He said he's working on growing.

He said he went to a therapist and just talking and talking.

But Donovan, he puts in the work. He's always there. I love that guy. Don, the Don. That's going to be what do you call it, a good friend --

JIM HARBAUGH: Trusted agent and known friend.

BLAKE CORUM: Trusted agent, known friend for life. That's my guy. I'm glad I got to share the backfield with Donovan. I wish Donovan nothing but the best, if he ever needed anything, best believe I'd be there for him.

J.J. MCCARTHY: I also wanted to mention something about Donovan. I've been honored to be his roommate for two years. And just knowing everything he goes through behind the scenes and just the man he is on a day-to-day basis, this couldn't have been a better moment for him to show out and show the world who he really is. And just so frickin' happy for the guy.

BLAKE CORUM: The Don is back.

JIM HARBAUGH: I'm going to talk about the defense. That was a spectacular game by our defense. Jesse Minter, the coaches, Coach Clink. Elite quarterback in Michael Penix.

This man, Will Johnson, talked at halftime we've got to get this momentum back. And darned if we don't get it back the first play of the second half. Pull it down. That was phenomenal.

And the tackling, we missed a couple, but just a couple.

Mike Sainristil, I hope somebody could go grab him and get him up here at the podium. Amazing. Amazing stalwart of a player. Just like these three that are here.

When a play needs to be made, Mike Sainristil has made it. When a play needs to be made, Blake Corum makes it. When a play needs to be made, Will Johnson makes it. When a play needs to be made, J.J. McCarthy makes it, Donovan Edwards makes it, Jaylen Harrell makes it, Junior Colson makes it, Rod Moore makes it.

We've just got great players. We've got great players that unanimously support each other. Those things that coaches talk about. You can't -- control what you can control. These guys control the uncontrollable things with how they train, how they work, how they play. And there's unanimous support for each other. You never doubt if someone on this team has your back.

Q. Blake, just wanted to ask a little bit about the first

quarter. You guys run for about 175 yards and then you guys went a little quiet with the ground game until you kind of got it back in the second half. Was it something that Washington did? Did they make an adjustment that you noticed? What happened there that kind of had you guys stall out just a bit before you got it going again?

BLAKE CORUM: They may have added another guy in the box, but they made some good plays too. That's why they were in the national championship. I give them the credit.

Like you said, we started fast. They slowed us up a little bit. But when we needed to start fast again, we started fast. They had us for a little bit. We knew they were going to get theirs.

JIM HARBAUGH: We had another ace up the sleeve. We had a play-action pass to Colston Loveland.

BLAKE CORUM: That was great.

JIM HARBAUGH: That was amazing because -- J.J. can talk about this, because I just saw it; he lived it -- but he went to release that ball and his arm got hit. And somehow you just wrist -- flicked the old booger off the end of the finger or something (laughter).

But you got the ball with some zip to Colston, had to be about 30 yards down the field. Talk about that. How did you do that? You did that.

J.J. MCCARTHY: First off, we set it up earlier. I think it was the drive before, running the same play. But it was actually a run.

And it was just one of those plays where just trusted my fundamentals, trusted the play, trusted Colston. Just seeing him over the middle and see the linebackers press up, I knew it was going to be there. I just had to get that ball off. And the line held up just enough. They held up just enough.

JIM HARBAUGH: Huge play. The fourth-and-13 play, Mike Sainristil makes that interception, returns it down to the 6 or 7 yard line. Will Johnson, that interception. Blake Corum, that big run. Donovan, his two big runs.

And that play right there, had to get the momentum back. They just scored, cut the lead to seven, and we hit that big 40-, 50-yarder. That was right on time.

Q. What box or boxes do you have left to check now in your coaching career after you've won a national



championship?

JIM HARBAUGH: That'll check the biggest box. For me, personally, just to be part of the family. With my dad, who won a national championship with Western Kentucky in 2002, and John Harbaugh, who won the Super Bowl 2012 season, 2013 Super Bowl.

I get to sit at the big person's table now. That feels really good. Just to be the only coach in your only family that hasn't won a national title or Super Bowl, the championship, that feels great, personally.

Q. Bo Schembechler stated he wanted a Michigan man to be at the head of the Michigan programs. Now a Michigan man has led the program back to pinnacle of success. How do you feel and how does it that the fact that that was something that was sort of written in law that Bo wanted and you were able to accomplish it?

JIM HARBAUGH: It feels great. I told the team last night that that means so much to me to be a Michigan man. Bo Schembechler would talk about the team, the team, the team.

When I was growing up, my dad coached here from '73 to '79, coached the secondary for Bo. He would come home and tell us things Bo said. And all the time we talked about the team, the team, the team and what that meant -- no man, no player, no coach bigger than the team.

And then when I played here at Michigan as a quarterback in the '80s, you heard it a lot, all the time -- the team, the team, the team.

And we brought that back when I came here in 2015 -- the team, the team, the team.

And we've made some additions to it. We talk about what's good for the bee is good for the hive and what's good for the hive is good for the bee. We talk about all kind of things. But that's what it comes from.

Just doing something that's bigger than for yourself, caring about somebody other than yourself, never being outworked, doing right. You don't lie. You don't cheat. You don't steal. And you give it the very best to your God-given ability. That and more.

I mean you could probably write a book, what it means to be a Michigan man. But some day, when they throw dirt over the top of me, if somebody who is eulogizing me, who was on this team or one of my teammates, when I was playing at Michigan, if they would simply say, "He was a Michigan man," that would mean everything. Would mean

everything to me.

And there's no question there's probably about 110 guys like that on our football team. And there's some young guys, some freshmen, some young sophomores that didn't quite know what it means yet, but -- like I didn't when I was a freshman and a sophomore in college.

It took time to realize just what a magnificent thing it is to be part of a team, where everybody has your back, everybody supports you unanimously.

We slip and we fail sometimes. But that's what a Michigan man does. He makes it right.

So as I said, I'm not the definition-maker of what a Michigan man is or isn't, but that's what's inside me. That's what I think of it.

And probably like anybody's life or life story. It would take a book to write it all. And that's what I think of being a Michigan man. It would probably take a book to put everything into it. But very proud, very proud to be a Michigan man.

Q. You used the racehorse analogy several times leading up to this game, blinders on, stretch run. You've crossed the wire. What's next?

JIM HARBAUGH: That was everything. That last phase line, that last one more game. And we won it. Such a one-track mind for our entire football team.

Just love it. That was one of our goals, win the next game. To have completed them all, you know, win the big games, win the Big Ten Championship, win the Rose Bowl, win the national championship, it just feels good. You just want to pull it down, you know. It's glorious, a glorious feeling.

Q. You just mentioned all those accomplishments and the big person's table. Would you want to add winning a Super Bowl to that?

JIM HARBAUGH: I just want to enjoy this. I just want to enjoy this. I hope you give me that. Can a guy have that? Does it always have to be what's next, what's the future?

Like I said the other day, yeah, I hope to have a future. I hope there's a tomorrow, a day after tomorrow, a next week, a next month, a next year.

And just one last thing. I've got two great loves. My love at work, the people I work with -- coaches, the staff, players. And the love I have for my family at home. It just means a lot. I see a couple of the kids right here -- Jimmy, Grace,

Sarah, Johnny, Jack, Katie, Addi -- the loves of my life.

better than us? Nobody.

And my brother John being here, and my dad and mom being here. And then to be here with our team, and that's those two families together celebrating, it's glorious. It is just a beautiful thing.

Q. Earlier this season you said, I don't have a tattoo, but if we go 15-0, I might consider getting one. What's your thoughts on that?

THE MODERATOR: We're joined by Kalen DeBoer, Michael Penix and Edefuan Ulofoshio.

KALEN DEBOER: First of all, just congrats to Coach Harbaugh and Michigan on a great season and a well-played game tonight. Obviously a very good football team.

And on our end I'm just proud of these guys. It starts with these two that are up here and everyone in the locker room. It wasn't what we were expecting. We came out, and I know our mentality and mindset was to come in and win the football game. But sometimes things don't always go the way that you want.

And I'm proud of what these guys have done this year and over the last two years. And we got a lot of great things happening within our program and a lot to build off of.

Q. Michael, basically how are you feeling? And I know there's a lot of emotions going through, but just what's that locker room like and what are some of those emotions you're feeling right now?

MICHAEL PENIX JR.: Hurt. I mean, like Coach said, we came here, we wanted to win. That's been our goal since day one. I said this since day one.

But, man, it sucks. We played a good team. They did some good things. I feel like on the offensive side of the ball, we just missed a lot of opportunities, opportunities where we needed to execute the most to help our team, put our team in a better position to come out with this win.

But in the locker room, it's just a lot of love. We're just a group that we have been through a lot together, man, and

we're not going to point fingers or nothing like that. It's a lot of love in the locker room.

Everybody is just showing their appreciation for each and every person that laid their body on the line, not just during the season but offseason, everything that we've been through. It's okay, though. We're good.

Q. Eddie, Michigan obviously comes in and they're physical every game, always have that approach. What did they do early that you guys struggled with? And how did you adjust to that as you went through the game?

EDEFUAN ULUFOSHIO: Just missed fits, to be honest with you. They went a couple gap schemes and we had one less guy. They had a really good scheme on the second touchdown because they went tackle over and the DBs were kind of like situated.

So I mean we have to correct it. But at the end of the day in games like this we can't make explosive mistakes like that. And ultimately it cost us. We battled, but at the end of the day we can't give those mistakes at the end. Just cleaning up. Simple fits. But like they did a really good job of being physical, staying on blocks, and that's what happened.

Q. Michael, you got pretty banged up there. I know you got stepped on at one point. Toward the end something on your right side. How are you feeling physically and what happened at the end there?

MICHAEL PENIX JR.: Better than I was three years ago. I'm just happy that I was able to finish it with the guys. I knew that I didn't want them to take me out of that game because I've been through it too much.

And I knew that no matter what, I was going to make sure I finished for the guys. And just give it my all. I'm not healthy, but I'll be there. I'm good. It's nothing major. I know that for sure.

I talked with the doctors and stuff like that. It's nothing major. If I had to play tomorrow, I'll play. I'm good.

Q. Michael, can you reflect on your long career and everything you've accomplished and the decision to come back for another year and being able to do everything you did with this team?

MICHAEL PENIX JR.: In my career, it was a lot. I feel like everything happened for a reason. Everybody knows my story. I've been through a lot. I've had ups and downs.

But I'm thankful for it all. I'm super blessed. Obviously, to me, Coach DeBoer, at Indiana, to lead me here, to be playing for the biggest game in college football, but obviously it didn't come out how we wanted it to. But I know each player on this team, they gave it their all, and it wasn't enough today.

And for me, I'm going to take accountability for the offensive side of the ball. I feel like we could have did better. Too many penalties. And we had a lot of offsides. And I'm going to put that on me because I've got to be louder. I've got to make sure that I'm great with my communication and stuff like that, so my offensive line isn't hearing ghosts.

It's been a long -- but I'm blessed. I'm blessed to be here. I'm blessed to be on this team, and these guys will be my brothers forever.

Q. Mike and Eddie, what are you proudest of your time at UW?

EDEFUAN ULOFOSHIO: Just resilience. I mean, to be honest, when we went 4-8, I completely lost hope. And I didn't know whether I wanted to like be a part of a rebuilding process. I really wouldn't be here without Coach DeBoer, to be straight and frank with you.

He gave me something to believe in, and even when I tore my ACL, three months later he still believed in me, still pushed me, still wanted me to be a leader. Even though I couldn't understand it, I appreciated it.

And I'm proud that we have people upstairs that truly care about the players. I'm proud of the University of Washington. It was an honor to play here. It was an honor to really wear the purple and gold.

I'm proud that not only did we bring this university back to where it belongs in terms of being a marquee university, I'm proud of these guys. All of us have been together for a long time. And we truly care about each other. We truly love each other. We eat together. We joke together. We play a bunch of games together and stuff.

So I'm proud of it all. I'm proud of every single moment I've

had here. It's been a blessing for sure. I have to thank the man upstairs for all of it.

Q. Mike, there's four drives in the second half where you guys had a chance to tie the game. Was there anything consistent about those, or why it didn't work out? And what did you make of the pressure that Michigan was able to get on you?

MICHAEL PENIX JR.: We knew we had to execute. We didn't execute the moment whenever we needed to. I feel like as far as the whole exotic stuff that they were doing on film and stuff that we saw against Alabama, I don't feel like we were confused or anything like that.

I just feel like it came down to executing. I missed a couple of throws. Just a couple of reads on routes and stuff like that. Just small details within our system that we do great all the time.

If it's shifts and emotions coming out of the huddle. It's small details and stuff like that caused us to be in a position where we didn't want to be in.

But I don't regret it all, but, man, I just know this team and I know the guys that we have under us.

And this team is going to be hungry again next year, and they're going to be competing again next year for a championship. I'm just super proud of this team and how far we've come, always being the underdog.

This is the only time you all were right. But we were able to fight and push through so much adversity and just people doubting us and not believing us and us throughout the season. And to get to this point, it's a blessing. And I know that everybody on this team worked for it.

Q. Michael, your team came into the game averaging 38 points. You only scored 13 tonight. Michigan has the top-rated defense in the country. What was it like facing that defense? And how good are they?

MICHAEL PENIX JR.: They're a good team. We just didn't execute in the moments when we needed to. It's just about executing. I don't feel like they did anything -- I feel like we beat ourselves.

And there were times we definitely had opportunities to make big-time plays, to make the game a lot different. But it comes down to executing. They're a good team, but we had a lot of opportunities.

Q. Along those lines, the fourth down that you missed Rome, was pretty open, was that just a

miscommunication where the route was going to go or how did you see that play?

MICHAEL PENIX JR.: It's on me. I just gotta make the throw. That's it.

Q. We could see it's an emotional night. I can see you're getting emotional while Mike's talking, while Eddie's talking. Just how much does this mean to you, and what are you feeling for them in a moment where they won 21 straight but weren't able to kind of finish the job tonight?

KALEN DEBOER: I think it's pretty clear what these guys are made of. These are two of the leaders that have led us all year long and over the last two seasons. When your hardest workers are your best players, you have good things happen.

And these guys led us in a way through great character, and they've just grown as leaders, and they brought a lot of people with them. They held each other accountable to another level.

And when you see players care so much about what's happening on the football field, when you see them love each other, when you see them have expectations and when you fall short like we did tonight, you just -- I'm sorry. I'm sorry that they couldn't realize a championship this year.

Because they made the sacrifices. They made the commitments. The goals that they had, the work supported it. And just tonight we couldn't get over the hump. We couldn't make the plays to tie the score. And sooner or later, when you're playing a good football team like we played tonight, they find a way to get to you in the fourth quarter like they did.

I just feel bad for the guys because they've given so much to each other. They've given me everything, everything they possibly can. And that's why I feel the way I do because I'm going to miss them. But I'm proud of them. Proud of what they've done for our program. I'm proud of what they have brought to our university, our community. And they've restored UW football, given us expectations that are what this program stands for and wants to have each and every year.

Q. This team hasn't been down by double digits all season. But could you talk about how they responded specifically on defense and how they were able to put pressure on Michigan?

KALEN DEBOER: Yeah, I think even just a two-score

game, it has happened a couple times over the last two seasons. And I keep telling the game's going to come back to them, and putting one more score on the board is always going to put pressure on the team because they know what we're capable of.

Again, we just couldn't make that one play here and there. And when we did, you know, a penalty, maybe bringing the play back, a holding call, things like that. We just couldn't get over the hump. We couldn't finish the drive the way that we're used to.

That's a credit to Michigan. There's a piece where I agree with Michael, we had some self-inflicted wounds that we did to ourselves. Just some penalties, some plays that we are usually going to be making, and we just didn't quite make them.

And it's not like anyone's not trying. They're giving everything they had. I could see it. And I could tell in the locker room that they left it all out there just by the pain that they're going through.

And that's, again, there's a piece that where Michigan did some things as well. Obviously a very good football team.

Q. At the end of the game, Penix comes over around the 20-yard line, you meet him at the side there. Can you share anything from that moment? And then secondly, what does this season and getting to this point do to springboard the program forward next year?

KALEN DEBOER: I just made sure, just asked him if he's all right, because I mean he was obviously hit quite a few times. Making sure he was okay. And it was a brief time we spent together there. Just wanted to make sure he knew how I felt about him.

And this guy came here, and the trust he put in me to put people around him, whether it be offensive staff, offensive coordinator, quarterbacks coach, other players, and he picked up and moved all the way across the country.

And I just can't tell you how much that means to me to have that trust from someone like Michael because this was his last crack at it, a year ago when he made that move, or two years ago when he made that move.

It was a time where we all know his story. It was kind of at that point where it was kind of do or die. And I knew in my mind what he was made of. I knew what he was capable of, and now it's just a matter of bringing it all together. And I can't tell you how much it means that he had that trust in me.

And seeing him grow and develop, and just the mindset he has, the fighter's mentality he has, the leadership. A lot of credit goes to our staff and working with him, Coach Grubb working with him. But, man, just seeing growth, seeing the fight, seeing the passion, the love that he has for everyone here in this program.

I hope Husky Nation just always holds him in the highest regard. I think they will. I expect nothing less than that because I think they understand also what he's given all of us.

Q. You once told us that you only play for championships. Now that this run has come to an end, were you amazed at all that you put this together so quickly in two years, that you got to this point, to challenge for a national championship? Because I think this is like a story that was really unusual for college football in general that this happened so quickly for the Huskies?

KALEN DEBOER: When you have a great quarterback and when you can have an offensive line -- and our defense came a long ways this year from a year ago. And I felt like at the end of last season, the last few games of the year, you could really feel like if everyone kept it together that this could happen.

When you're in the moment, when you're going through it, it's not about all of a sudden going from 4-2, which we were at one point, to saying, hey, we're going to go win a national championship. But I felt like there were some of the makings of being a special football team.

And credit to the guys. They just hung in there with the process and just focused on improving every single day, a year ago and this year. It's just built up to this moment. And it's execution. It's physical toughness. It's all led to a mindset where anything that comes their way, they felt like they could come through and get it done.

I truly feel like five minutes ago, man, there was nothing but belief that we would find a way to win that football game. I really believe that.

Q. The second part, the springboard forward.

KALEN DEBOER: I think you get to this point and been a part of it many times. You always look at the guys. We're losing this guy. We're losing that guy. And some of these guys are just super special players.

But they've raised the standard again back to where it should be in our program. And a lot of guys got a chance

to see what it's supposed to look like. Seeing guys like Eddie and Michael do their thing and lead and what the work is that you've got to put in, and how hard it is to win a football game each and every week, how hard it now obviously is to win a championship.

But a lot of guys have seen what it takes. And because of what we've done this year, we'll be very attractive for guys to come in, guys who want to win championships come into this program and believe that it can happen again next year.

It's such a fine line. It's just such a fine line. We've seen it all season between winning and losing. And I feel like I know what the score looks like, but I feel like that fine line was right there again tonight. And we weren't that far off.

There's not a doubt in my mind that we have a good enough football team to go out there and win a national championship. And just gotta make a play here and there, get us over the hump, and it could have been a different outcome.

Q. Tonight's game was the end of an era for your school and the conference it's been in for decades. Any reflection on what this conclusion means, and the history that's coming to an end with Washington and the Pac-12?

KALEN DEBOER: Yeah, I think here at the end it was just really focused on what we were doing for UW. But I am proud of our representation of Pac-12 football, West Coast football, because I'll say it right now, I think that our conference, what we went through each and every week is as tough as any that any team could have had in the entire country. There's just a lot of really good teams, a lot of really good coaches.

And I'm proud of what we accomplished. Not just the overall record, but each and every week, having to be our best because the teams that we were lining up across from us were extremely strong.

There's multiple teams that could have been knocking on the door of being a conference champion, being even in a final four. I really believe that.

There's some really good football that's been played on the West Coast. I tip my hat to those coaches that have been part of Pac-12.

And obviously our history in Pac-12 and it comes to an end, but all our alumni who have been a part of so many big games and giving us a tradition, I'm going to make sure we always remember those.



It's sad to see the Pac-12 have this time right now that we're coming to an end with. But I just am glad that we represented West Coast football, Pac-12, the way we did this year.

- **First Score.** Michigan scored a touchdown on it opening possession for the **sixth** time in 15 games (to go with two field goals and seven punts). The **41-yard** TD run by Donovan Edwards was the second-longest TD run in CFP championship game history (behind a 50-yard TD run by Derrick Henry vs. Clemson in 2016).
➤ On the next possession, Edwards scored from **46 yards** out, giving him the top two longest scoring runs in a CPF title game.

- **Washington** scored on its opening drive for the 10th time in 15 games (8 TD, 2 FG) with the 25-yard Grady Gross field goal tonight; it was just the third time an opponent scored on the game's opening drive against **Michigan** (Rutgers scored a TD, Maryland a FG).

- **Michigan's** Blake Corum outdid his teammate on the last play of the first quarter, with his **59-yard** run the second-longest rush in CFP title game behind a 67-yard run by Georgia's James Cook versus in 2022.

- **Michigan's** first third down play came on its 16th play from scrimmage; it gained 235 yards on its first 15 plays (15.7 per). The Wolverines were 5-of-5 on second down conversions in the first quarter.

- **Michigan's** first two TD drives gave Washington its biggest deficit of the season - **11 points** - leading 14-3. Michigan's following field goal extended the season-long deficit to 14 at 17-3.

- **Michigan's** 229 yards in the first quarter was its best first-quarter output of the season - previous was 168 vs. Rutgers.

- **Michigan's** 290 total yards is its second-best first-half total yardage mark of the season. The Wolverines racked up 339 total yards at Michigan State on Oct. 21.

- Following the first quarter, **Washington** had given up a combined **480** total yards on 43 plays in its last two quarters, an average of 11.1 yards per play. UW gave up 251 total yards to Texas in the fourth quarter of last week's Sugar Bowl and 229 to Michigan in the first quarter tonight; the Huskies rebounded to allow just 61 in the second quarter, forcing two punts with a fourth down stop.

- **Michigan's** three scoring drives to open the game are the first time for the Wolverines to score on three consecutive drives since the second half against Ohio State, a span of 28 drives. Michigan scored on four straight drives - FG, TD, FG, FG - against the Buckeyes spanning the third and fourth quarters.

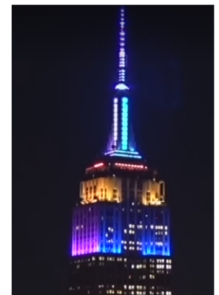
